Holy Week, beginning on Palm Sunday and culminating in the great Festival of the Resurrection, Easter Day, is the center of the Church Year for Christians. Consequently, the liturgies used during that week are distinctive to the season itself and are not used at other times during the year.

On **Palm Sunday**, March 24, our 8:00 a.m. Eucharist will be no different from other Sundays except that palms will be blessed and distributed. At the 10:00 a.m. Eucharist, however, we will gather outside around the stone cross near Frankfort Avenue (weather permitting) to hear the reading of the Palm Sunday story of Jesus' triumphal procession into Jerusalem and to bless and distribute the palms. We will then process together into church for the Eucharist during which the Passion Gospel will be read

persons from the congregation participating. There will be no church school classes so all may gather in Langley Hall to welcome our Bishop.

**Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday** of Holy Week are quiet days between the acclaim of Jesus on Palm Sunday and the immediate events leading up to his Crucifixion later in the week. We will have our usual Tuesday morning Eucharist at 10:00 a.m., and Morning Prayer at 9:00 a.m. each day.

**Maundy Thursday**, March 28, is the day of the Last Supper, Jesus' institution of the Holy Eucharist, and the time when Jesus washed his disciples' feet. We will observe the full liturgy for the day with the Holy Eucharist at 6:30 p.m. in the midst of which the Foot-Washing will take place. Following the service we will have an Agape (Fellowship) Meal in commemoration of that last meal Jesus had with his disciples. The Maundy Thursday Service concludes with the Stripping of the Altar. This liturgical section commemorates the agony of Christ in the Garden. As Christ prepared for the crucifixion, we prepare the Sanctuary for Good Friday.

**Good Friday**, March 29, is the day of the Crucifixion, and the Good Friday Liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer will be used at noon and 6:30 p.m. There will be a sermon and special music.

In a particularly dramatic part of this liturgy a wooden cross is brought into the church, and while this cross is set before the congregation, we will have prayers and music commemorating the Crucifixion. In order to celebrate the joy of the Resurrection on Easter Day you will want to know the sorrow of the Crucifixion.

After the great events of Holy Week, **Easter Day**, March 31, comes in all its beauty and joy, with a church massed with flowers, and there will be music and Scripture to lift the spirit with our yearly reminder that God is victorious. We will worship at our usual times of 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. on Easter Sunday. (There will be no church school classes.)

\*Children, please remember to bring a few flowers from your yard to make our bare wooden cross come alive with color on Easter Sunday!

## St. Mark's Gets a Curate

---

The Bishop of Kentucky, with the consent of the Rector and Vestry of St. Mark's, has placed The Rev. Mark Feather with us as a part-time curate. Mark has been the curate at the Church of the Advent since August 2001 as well as Campus Minister at the University of Louisville where he will continue to serve. An attorney with a large local law firm for eighteen years, Mark was ordained as a deacon in June 2001, and he is a candidate for ordination as a priest. We welcome Mark, his spouse, Marilyn, and their children, Carl and Laura!

What is a curate? A curate is a member of the clergy who has just been ordained and has his or her first position in a parish; this person is said to be serving a "curacy" in that place. It may also mean the assisting clergy in a large parish, although usually after a new curate has been on the job for awhile, he or she becomes the assistant rector or associate rector and leaves the title curate behind.

## Lent

Lent is the season of the church year that runs for forty weekdays and six Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Easter and is a special season of preparation for Easter. The liturgical colors are purple or the natural color of unbleached linen. The penitential tone of the season is reflected in the prohibition of the singing of the Gloria in Excelsis during Lent. Many people observe Lent by undertaking special programs of study; many practice self-denial. The purpose of Lent is not self-punishment but preparation for Easter through concentration on fundamental values and priorities.

## Maundy Thursday Supper

---

If you plan to come to Maundy Thursday Supper, and we hope you do, then please indicate so on the sheet in the Information Center. For planning purposes it is very important that you sign up for this meal. We ask you to indicate when you sign up whether you will bring bread or fruit or cheese for the supper. If you bring bread, no sliced bread, please—bring homemade bread or a loaf from a bakery. If you bring cheese, no sliced cheese, please. If you bring fruit, bananas, oranges, grapes, or apples will be fine. Soup, wine, and grape juice will be provided, and a basket will be passed to help defray the cost. Please bring your food items to the kitchen before you go to church so they can be on the tables when you go back to Langley Hall to eat.

The supper is a quiet, simple supper commemorating the meal Jesus had with his disciples. There will be special table prayers before eating and a Scripture reading and some songs during the meal along with music while you eat. Following supper, we will

adjourn to church for the Stripping of the Altar. You can expect this event to last until about 8:45 p.m. Remember: church is at 6:30 p.m. followed immediately by the supper, all concluding with the Stripping of the Altar.

## The Great Vigil of Easter

---

**Saturday March 30, 8:30 p.m.**

The ancient Vigil of Easter, the keystone about which the rest of the church year is built, is a beautifully dramatic liturgy which “celebrates and makes present the pivotal events of our Old and New Testament heritage. The pass-over of the Hebrews from the bondage of slavery in Egypt to the freedom of the Promised Land, the passover of our Lord Jesus Christ from death, and our own passover from the bondage of sin and death to the glorious liberty of new life in Christ Jesus,” (Marion Hatchett, [Commentary on the American Prayer Book](#)). In the early centuries of the church, it was the night for baptisms.

This year we will gather at 8:30 p.m., March 30, in the courtyard of the Galleria, Fourth Avenue and Liberty Street, with members of Christ Church Cathedral and the Roman Catholic Cathedral of the Assumption for the lighting of the Paschal Candle. We will then proceed to our respective Cathedrals for baptisms, confirmations, and the first Eucharist of Easter.

Among those to be confirmed or received by Bishop Gulick at the Easter Vigil are St. Markers Melissa Gill, Katie Shannon, Sarah Shannon, Ginnie Taber and Kathryn Taber. A festive Easter party follows the service. The Great Vigil is a glorious beginning to our Easter celebration as a Diocesan family, and you are invited to attend!
