Christian Education

Church School will resume on Sunday, September 13, immediately following the 10 am worship service. We have a great program for all ages, and our church school teachers are ready for an exciting year.

“Godly Play” will continue as the curriculum for children in preschool through fourth grade. The program is modeled on the Montessori approach to learning. The “Godly Play” approach supports, challenges, nourishes and helps children on their spiritual quest. “Godly Play” assumes that children have some experience of the mystery of the presence of God in their lives, but that they lack the language, the permission, and the understanding to express and enjoy that spiritual experience in our secular culture. Through the telling of Bible stories, “Godly Play” teaches children the language that they need to discover God, themselves, one another, and the world around them.

Our fifth and sixth graders this year will meet together using a curriculum designed for their age-group and published by Leader Resources, the creators of the “Journey to Adulthood” curriculum that we use in grades 7-12. “A Catechism Curriculum” uses the broad questions of the Prayer Book Catechism as its basis and allows the children to explore key Christian concepts from “God the Father” to “The Sacraments,” to “Forgiveness and Redemption,” while treating the topics in a manner relevant to the lives of ten and eleven-year-olds. They will engage in discussions of scripture, watch and discuss movies, act out dramatic scenes, and much more.

Our seventh through twelfth graders will continue to participate in the “Journey to Adulthood” (J2A) program that we have been using for the past few years at St. Mark's. J2A is a developmentally-based spiritual formation for young people that forms disciples of Jesus who can see their lives in light of the gospel, engage in the practice of prayer, feel that they are a part of the congregation, and feel free to ask questions on their faith journeys.

We will have several offerings for adults this fall during the Church School hour. Our Fall Coffee Hour Series is entitled, “*St. Mark's: Who were we then? Who are we*

now? Who do we want to become?" Outreach News: Hunger

The true communion that we share as members of Christ's Body is clearly seen in our table fellowship with one another, open widely to all those who hunger in body and in soul. As Christ feeds us, so we too are called to feed others. At St. Mark's we have several opportunities this fall to provide food and fellowship to those around us:

Parishioner Janie Estes encourages us to join her in her work with the Stone Soup Community Kitchen, an area group whose mission is to encourage a sustainable

local food economy and to support farmers by using local food to prepare community meals, especially in underserved neighborhoods where the availability of fresh, local food and the skills and experience with which to prepare it are lacking. Bringing together people from varied backgrounds and cultures around the table, the group meets to cook with local farmer's market ingredients and then to sit down together to eat what they have prepared. There is usually a talk about nutrition and eating habits during the meal, as well as children's activities. The next "Stone Soup" events will be September 19 at 2 pm at the Victory Park Farmer's Market; October 3 at 4 pm at the Fb3 Food Development Kitchen, 624 E. Market St.; and November 7 at 4 pm at the Americana Community Center. "Stone Soup" is a program of the Community Farm Alliance, a statewide organization whose motto is "real change comes from the ground up." They are presently working hard to promote the Smoketown-Shelby Park Farmer's Market at Meyzeek Middle School. This Thanksgiving, we would like to bring back the traditional St. Mark's Thanksgiving Dinner... with a twist! Instead of feeding only ourselves at this special meal on the Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving, we would like to invite the Wednesday night AA group to join us for dinner. St. Mark's has a long history of hosting the oldest and largest AA and Alanon groups in the city, and it is fitting that we share our community on Thanksgiving, as well as our building. We cannot proceed with our plans, however, without your help! We need volunteers to help prepare the meal. If you would like to help in the kitchen with this project, please sign up in the Information Center or contact Janie Estes, Thanksgiving Dinner Coordinator, by October 25.

The Kentuckiana Interfaith Community and Dare to Care Food Bank are teaming up to bring hunger to the forefront of our community's attention and working together to raise money to get more food to more people in need through the Louisville Hunger Walk. The walk will take place on Sunday afternoon, October 18 at Waterfront Park. The walk/run takes place on a 5K course that will cross the George Rogers Clark Bridge and return to the Festival Plaza, where a Fun Fair and Expo will await participants. The cost of participating in the walk will be \$25 for adults and \$15 for youth (18 and under), if registered before October 14. All net proceeds from the Hunger Walk will benefit Dare to Care Food Bank and The World Food Program. 75% of the net

proceeds will go to Dare to Care Food Bank's Emergency Food Purchasing Program providing nutritious food, including produce, to over 100,000 people in Kentucky and southern Indiana. The remaining 25% of the net proceeds will go to The World Food Program, the world's leading international hunger relief agency. We hope to have a St. Mark's team in the Hunger Walk, so be on the lookout for sign-up sheets in the Information Center. Donations for Dare to Care will also be accepted.

Other upcoming Outreach opportunities:

Calling all St. Mark's Youth and Adults: We hope to have a St. Mark's team participating in the 2009 Louisville AIDS Walk on Sunday, September 13. The Louisville AIDS Walk unites the community, raising much-needed funds for direct services for our local neighbors in Louisville and southern Indiana who are living with HIV/AIDS. A coalition of 11 non-profit agencies and many dedicated volunteers support and help organize this community event. 100% of net proceeds go to fund direct client services such as food, housing, medication assistance, public transportation to medical appointments, counseling, etc. Registration for the Walk begins at 1 pm on the Belvedere; the 5K run begins at 2 pm and the Walk (and Pet Walk!) begins at 3 pm. *The St. Mark's Team will meet at the Belvedere at 1 pm, and a sign-up sheet and pledge forms are available in the Information Center.* If you are interested in carpooling downtown, please contact Anne Vouga.

The Episcopal Church Home is one of six sponsors of the Alzheimer's Association Memory Walk this year on September 12 at 8:30 am at the Waterfront Park Great Lawn. The goal of the Walk is to raise awareness and funds for Alzheimer's care, support, and research. The Assistant Rector's Reflections on the Psalms

"The idols of the nations are silver and gold, the work of human hands.
