The Rector's Class For Catechumens and Fellow Travelers

In this year-long class, Charles will discuss the “basics” of the Christian faith and Episcopal Church history and practice, including all the topics necessary to prepare those new to the Episcopal Church for baptism, confirmation, reception or renewal. What do adult baptism, confirmation, reception, and renewal involve in the Episcopal Church?

The catechumenate is the process that prepares us for baptism. Adults who are preparing for baptism are called catechumens. Baptism is the rite of full initiation, by water and the Holy Spirit, into membership in the Christian church. Those who have already been baptized in other denominations or as infants do not need to be baptized again.

Confirmation is the rite in which we express our faith and commitment to Christ, and through prayer and the laying on of hands by the bishop, receive strength from the Holy Spirit to continue a life of faith and commitment. Confirmation preparation consists of a period of study and the reaffirmation of baptismal vows and is not just for teenagers. At St. Mark's we prepare for confirmation by becoming “fellow travelers” with the catechumens.

Reception is the rite of affiliation with this part of the body of Christ (the Episcopal Church), by the public affirmation of faith and reception by the bishop, for those who have previously received the sacrament of confirmation in another part of the body of Christ. At St. Mark's we prepare for reception by becoming “fellow travelers” with the catechumens.

Renewal is the rite, for those who have been baptized and confirmed, in which we express a renewed commitment to the baptismal vows. Renewal is signified by a public affirmation of the baptismal vows, prayer, and the laying on of hands by the bishop. At St. Mark's we prepare for renewal by becoming “fellow travelers” with the catechumens.

Of course, anyone is welcome to attend the Rector's class as a “fellow traveler” on our faith journeys. Attendance does not necessitate participation in a rite.

Music

Our Royal School of Church Music Choral Scholars Program began on Sunday, September 20. Eight participants are currently enrolled in this choral training program: six elementary and two high school students. The elementary students rehearse at noon on Sundays, and the high school students rehearse with the adult choir at 8:30 a.m. on Sundays. They will rehearse every week and sing with the adult choir every four to five weeks.

Our adult choir is learning many new, challenging anthems and service music. As we begin rehearsals for upcoming feasts, now would be a great time to join us. If you are interested, please call Mac Fogle, Organist and Choirmaster at the parish office.

Stewardship

As we begin our annual stewardship emphasis and “Every Member Canvass,” I want to thank all of you for your generosity. Generosity is a virtue. Many wish to be generous: generous with who we are and with what we have. But you not only wish it, you manage to actually do it. Is there a much better feeling than opening your hand, your heart to another and giving? To be generous is to be big-hearted—magnanimous, which means “great soul.” What does it mean to be large-souled, magnanimous? It is the opposite of petty or stingy. It operates from a mind set of abundance - - how much God has done, has given - - rather than from a mind set of scarcity - - how little there is to go around.

Whenever I think of generosity I think of the text in John where Mary, sister of Martha, anointed Jesus’ feet with expensive oils. Matthew and Mark place this scene in Bethany at the house of Simon the Leper, and the woman who anoints Jesus is unnamed. John places it in the home of Martha, Mary and Lazarus with Mary as the anointer.

The text begins: “Six days before Passover Jesus came to Bethany.” This scene is a prelude to the Passion. Jesus is headed to his death. And where does he go but to Bethany and to the house of Mary, Martha and Lazarus, where the one who had no place to lay his head experienced as much home as he was ever to know. He loved them; they were friends.

“There they made him a supper,” the text says, then adds, “Martha served.” Isn’t she always serving? In Luke 10 we have the famous scene of Martha fretting in the kitchen and complaining to Jesus about Mary sitting at his feet, listening, while she worked. But she must have learned too, for in the preceding chapter in John’s Gospel she makes the supreme confession of faith that John records: “I believe you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one coming into the world” (11:27).

And there was Lazarus, over whom Jesus had wept when he heard he had died, whom Jesus raised from the dead and who now was trying to figure out how to live the rest of his rescued life.

And there was Mary, the “ideal disciple” who in Luke’s story sat at his feet and learned of him. The traditional role of male disciples as they learned from rabbi/masters. And Jesus affirmed her as a disciple equal to any.

The anointing. Mary took the costly perfume of pure nard and anointed Jesus’ feet and wiped them with her hair.

“And the fragrance filled the room.” Did Mary have the Song of Solomon on her lips: “While the king was at his table my nard gave forth its fragrance” (1:12)?

We do not normally associate acts of witness and love with the service of smell, but why not? The smell of freshly baked bread given to another. Or of a roomful of sweaty little four-year-olds in Vacation Bible School after outdoor playtime. The smell of a room prepared for a guest.

Judas’ objection. “Why was this ointment not sold for three hundred denari and given to the poor?” Judas was counting! Matthew and Mark place the objection on the lips of the disciples as a whole. John, who is depicting Judas as one moving from the realm of light to the realm of darkness, makes Judas the accuser.

The objection has its point. What church serious about discipleship does not struggle consciously with the tension between money spent in beautiful acts of worship and money spent on behalf of the poor? As Camus put it so memorably: “There is beauty and there are the humiliated, and we must try, hard as it is, not to be unfaithful to one or the other.”

The beauty of our stone worship space, with its slate roof and stain glass windows was built, was given by parishioners of St. Mark’s, as an extravagant act of devotion. And our thirty plus years of mission to Crescent Hill through helping start and then nourishing the United Crescent Hill Ministries has been an extravagant act of devotion to God and to Jesus, who said, “Inasmuch as you’ve done it to one of the least of these my brethren, you have done it unto me.”

Anthems raised in church and meals served at Wayside Mission or the Ronald McDonald House. It’s all praise. And visits to the lonely and love of the forgotten, and Church School for children, and the organ, and help for children wanting to attend summer camp, and those weighed down by life’s onslaughts, and telling the gospel of God’s love in Christ to those who feel like spiritual orphans. It’s all praise.

Here is Jesus’ response to Judas: “Let her alone!” It is his sharp, clear defense of this woman. Jesus defends Mary as he did in Luke when he said, “Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her!” (continued on page 4)

Then Jesus' words so easily misunderstood: "The poor you will have with you always;" but Jesus was clearly not counseling a neglect of the poor. He was in fact quoting Deuteronomy 15:11, whose message is unmistakable:

For the poor will never cease out of the land; therefore I command you,
You shall open your hand...to the needy and to the poor, in the land.

Jesus concludes, "But you will not always have me." Jesus reminds us of his coming death. This beautiful act of devotion came and comes in the midst of a world of treachery and betrayal. It is a world whose violence and cruelty crucify people every day.

In such a world of darkness and pain, and of global problems that seem cataclysmic and beyond solution, God calls us to receive the gift of wonder and to rejoice in small moments of love and joy like this one in Bethany with Jesus and his friends.

We are tempted some days to close in and give little, to turn to cynicism and despair. But this world belongs to God we confess, we "faith" together, and "though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet!"

The Assistant Rector's Reflection on the Psalms

Meditation on Psalm 42: "As a deer longs for flowing streams, so my soul longs for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God ... These things I remember, as I pour out my soul: how I went with the throng, and led them in procession to the house of God, with glad shouts and songs of thanksgiving ... By day the Lord commands his steadfast love, and at night his song is with me, a prayer to the God of my life."

Often my soul is a soft, timid creature with wide-set velvet eyes, caught in a life of approach and retreat. Drawn by an insistent thirst, I step hesitantly toward the open spaces, but the sound of a snapping twig sends me sliding into the protection of familiar shadows. I imagine danger all around; I see enemies in blurred and distant shapes. My wariness overpowers my longing. Yet I know how to pretend, O God. In the robes of a lion I can lead others into the clearing, advancing boldly in my borrowed finery. How good it feels to praise you with the lion's roar and to sing loud thanksgivings for water that I pour but do not always taste. When memories of that water grow dim and the lion's robes are hanging lifeless in the closet, my soul yet again grows timid and can only be lured from the forest with a prayer. May your song of loving-kindness be my prayer, surround my prayer, carry my prayer, O God of my life.

Outreach News

The Outreach Committee at St. Mark's will meet on September 30 to assess this first year's effort to enhance our communication about Outreach and to expand St. Mark's engagement in Outreach activities. Our assessment of our own work so far indicates that the message is getting out more effectively than before: in the weekly e-mail postings, the weekly bulletins, the website, the bulletin boards and calendar in the Information Center, and through the monthly St. Marker. Our goal for this second year is to continue to keep the information flowing and to attempt to identify those Outreach activities that parishioners believe are central to who St. Mark's is and wants to become as a parish. If you have thoughts about Outreach in general or about Outreach at St. Mark's, please contact Anne Vouga or Connie Jaquith, chair of the Outreach Committee. We also have an Outreach box in the parish office where you can leave any messages or notes for Anne or for the Committee. You are also welcome to join us at the September 30 meeting at 5:00 p.m.

Ongoing collections for various items needed by charities are near the Information Center or by the soda machine. There is an increased need for DARE TO CARE items in these challenging economic times:

- *Food and toiletries (shampoo, soap, toothpaste, etc.) collection for United Crescent Hill Ministries. The Dare to Care basket is always by the Information Center in the foyer.
- *Collection of bags of yarn to knit scarves for mariners at Seaman's Ministry.
- *Collection of soda can tabs for Ronald McDonald House, on the table in the Information Center.
- *Collection basket for small toiletries for House of Ruth or Kentucky Correctional Institute is near the soda machine.
- *ECW is requesting that St. Markers save their plastic bags from shopping for them to use for the Bazaar in December. Please leave the bags in the doorway to the basement stairs (located near the Information Center).

THE HOMEWORK HELP PROGRAM HAS BEGUN! This is an effort to help Karen refugee students and families who have relocated to Louisville. The school tutoring takes place every Wednesday, 3:30 to 5:00, nearby at Crescent Hill Baptist Church. It is part of our cooperative mission with Kentucky Refugee Ministries and Resurrection parish, where many Karen refugees have become members. Swine Flu and St. Mark's

Last Spring, when the H1N1 virus was spreading rapidly through the Southwest, our bishop (who is also the provincial bishop of Ft. Worth) was asked by public health officials to cease communion and the passing of the peace until the spread of the virus was under control. He did so, instructing all the parishes in the Diocese of Ft. Worth to observe Morning Prayer services, rather than Holy Eucharist, until further notice.

After a few weeks, the restriction was lifted. Should the spread of H1N1 become a concern in Kentucky this flu season, the same procedure will be followed in this diocese. Public health officials will contact the bishop and the bishop will instruct the clergy in charge of congregations. If such precautions become necessary, it is important:

- to encourage everyone to recognize that the Church has a responsibility to take public health considerations seriously, and
- to remember that responsible practice in this area is not primarily about protecting ourselves, but about avoiding transmitting infection unwittingly to others.

Until such a time, we will take common sense steps, such as washing our hands regularly and staying home if we are not feeling well.
